

A Day in the Life of the Nara Palace Site

Experience the skills of the craftsmen and the work of the officials of Nara Palace

Here, while viewing a 5:1 scale model of the Daiichiii Daigokuden (Former Imperial Audience Hall) up-close that was manufactured as part of its reconstruction you can experience first-hand a variety of crafts from the time, such as the creation of kumimono (wooden support blocks), clay tile roofing, and documents that were written on mokkan (wooden tablets).
